A Statement from Bishop L. Jonathan Holston:

Here we are again.

Once more, we find ourselves in anguish over the loss of young lives in a mass shooting – this time with 17 dead and more than a dozen wounded at a high school in South Florida. Less than two months into this year, 30 mass shootings have been reported in our country.

We pray for those young people suffering from bullet wounds. We pray for the families of the dead and injured students and teachers. We pray for those who have been traumatized by what they have seen in their school, in what should be a safe place.

We thank God for the first responders, teachers and others who put their lives at risk to protect and save the innocent; for the doctors, nurses and other medical professionals who work to heal; for the volunteers who donate life-saving blood, both this week and year-round. Many of you have heard me say there is a difference between wishing and hoping. Hoping includes a plan for fulfilling our wishes. As a society, we must move from wishing that this escalating problem will improve to hoping that it will by taking concrete steps to make our communities safer and reduce the possibilities of mass shootings.

As United Methodists committed to social justice and opposed to gun violence, we know we must address this escalating, yet preventable, slaughter of innocents.

For some of us, hoping means developing relationships with at-risk youth in our communities, surrounding them with a community of support and accountability. This work requires time, courage and an investment of ourselves and our resources.

For some of us, hoping means working with our legislators to develop realistic strategies that reduce the frequency of mass shootings while also supporting responsible gun ownership. The two do not have to be mutually exclusive. This work also requires time and courage.

For some of us, hoping means working as a congregation alongside and within the schools in our communities to support teachers and school personnel in making sure that troubled young people don't escape notice and slip through the cracks. Again, courage, time and personal investment will make the difference.

In this season of Lent, we must continue to pray for victims, survivors and their families. Let us also pray for the courage to put feet to our faith and to act in ways that bring healing and hope to a culture of fear and despair.

I also encourage you to take to heart the words (see below) of Bishop Ken Carter, resident bishop of The Florida Conference, which includes the community of Parkland.

Bishop Ken Carter's statement on Florida school shootings

On Ash Wednesday, our services announced the biblical imperative to "repent and believe the gospel." In light of the Florida shootings, we repent from our participation in a culture of death; we acknowledge the harm we do to others, and we claim the power of the cross that breaks the cycle of violence and retaliation. We also grieve with the communities of Parkland and Coral Springs, Florida, in the deaths of 17 persons and the wounding of many others on the campus of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. A number of surrounding United Methodist Churches have students at this school, and our connection will support their healing ministry in the days ahead.

Celebrating our 50th Anniversary: Decade 2



This is the second in a series of five articles highlighting events during the 50-year history of St. Andrew By-The-Sea UMC. This article was originally written for our 40th anniversary by Eva Norton-Prude, our Church Historian at that time.

The second decade in the church's life was an exciting one. As new members joined, more ideas, more contributions and donations, and more activities followed! In 1978, 97 children attended the first Vacation Bible School, two worship services were needed, and Holy Communion was observed on the first Sunday of each month. Parking lot improvements were completed, and a committee was appointed for development of the Sanctuary. They enlisted the services of a local artist, Wayne Edwards, to design a cross, communion table, altar, and chancel rail. Funds were donated by sev-

eral members to cover costs, and a spinet organ was given in memory of some founding members. The church's 10th Anniversary was celebrated in June with the dedication of the beautiful cross and table, and communion was served on a new brass set. Children made and hung large banners in the foyer and hall-way. A picnic followed the worship service.

In the month that followed, a building fund was started to construct an Educational Building; weekly worship bulletins were printed; a Girl Scout Troop, sponsored by the church met here each week; the first Pictorial Directory was developed; special events celebrated Thanksgiving and Christmas; and the church's first Lay Minister was approved.

Cooper Stonestreet became our third minister in June 1979. He presided over the construction of the two-story Educational Building and office complex, which adjoined the Sanctuary. The building was completed in 1980. By now there were 477 members, so a choir director was appointed, as well as a paid custodian. A newsletter, *The Fisherman*, was begun. In September, members filled the altar with flowers as an expression of gratitude that God spared the Island during Hurricane David. Fundraisers and sales from the now-annual Fall Festival provided furniture and equipment for the new classrooms, nursery, and offices.

The church's first drama production was in 1981, with many to follow. A new church library was established. A beautiful 2-octave set of handbells was given by a church family, and all facilities and programs were enhanced. The year of hard work was celebrated at Christmas with a wonderful choir concert and candlelight service.

The years 1982-85 were filled with the excitement of financial commitments being met, even exceeded, so that St. Andrew was able to expand its mission and ministry to the Conference and worldwide. The Fall Festival was a much-anticipated annual event, drawing shoppers throughout the Low Country.

The "Outstanding Church Woman of the Year" award was established.

In June 1985, the church welcomed its fourth pastor, Harold Lewis, and his wife, Edna. A parsonage built in Hilton Head Plantation was completed in July. UMW members worked for months to publish a cookbook, and the handsomely designed *Islanders Cook For Company* became an Island best seller requiring a second printing. A total of 2,420 copies were sold at \$7 each, and profits were used for mission and ministry opportunities. Before the end of the year, an organist and assistant choir director were hired. Members participated in the ongoing Island Food Basket.

In early 1986, a Building Committee was selected to make preliminary plans and proposals for construction of a new Sanctuary. In June, their proposals were presented for a major building program to include a new Sanctuary, renovation of the existing one into a Fellowship Hall, and make changes to improve the entire Educational Building and grounds. After discussion of details, the plan was unanimously approved, and a financial campaign "From Vision To Victory" began immediately. That summer saw landscape and parking lot preparation, even as regular church activities continued. The excitement was contagious, as many friends of the church contributed to its success.



By 1987, a third printing of the UMW Cookbook was ordered, and it was decided to establish a Scholarship Fund with profits. The "From Vision To Victory" campaign continued, led by Proverbs 29:18: "Where there is no vision, the people shall perish." There was intensive communication and prayer, a church-wide banquet, and a decision to use part of the Fall Festival profits to help our own mission needs. Larry Mercer was named director of music. A Memorials Committee was established.


The Altar Guild began the tradition of cascading the altar with lilies at Easter and poinsettias at Christmas. Certainly the major event of the year was the July 19, 1987, groundbreaking for the new sanctuary!

One Great Church, Two Front Doors

The One Great Church, Two Front Doors campaign culminates on March 30. The gifts to the campaign have allowed St. Andrew to complete not one, but numerous projects including new air conditioning for the Sanctuary, renovated children and youth spaces at the Hilton Head Campus, and the purchase of approximately 10 acres on

Buckwalter for the future location of our Bluffton Campus. The land, which cost \$600,000 was completely paid for in just two years! What a fantastic witness and huge savings of interest!
