As we enter May and the program year starts to wind down, we begin to look to the many activities of summer, including our 50th Anniversary Worship Celebrations on July 1. Pentecost is quickly approaching on May 20. The United Methodist Church website tells us: *Pentecost is one of the principal days of the Christian year, celebrated on the fiftieth day after Easter. The Greek word pentecoste means "fiftieth day." Pentecost is the day on which the Christian church commemorates the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles and others assembled in Jerusalem. On Monday morning 6/18 host families would provide breakfast, and if possible a bag lunch, and drop off their guests at the church by 9:00

Join The Collectibles Group

The Collectibles Group which meets on the 3rd Tuesday of every month still has not come up with a jazzier name, but our numbers have grown and we are having fun learning about other areas of collecting beyond our own collections.

In March the program was on antique silver, and Sunni Bond "teased" us all with a quiz on the purpose of several antique serving pieces she took from her own collection. From strawberry forks to food pushers to butter picks and mustard spoons, we had a good time guessing what to do with these various pieces! Sunni told the story of having a dinner guest ask the purpose of the food pusher (one had been put at every place) and before Sunni could explain about food pushers in the Victorian era, another guest said it was to make a hole in the mashed potatoes for the gravy! That turned out to be a good purpose too! Food pushers were to be used by children to push food onto their fork, rather than using their fingers or even the bread. A food pusher looks somewhat like a silver version of a modern-day BIC razor, the disposable kind.

The April meeting was a learning experience for many of the members as we learned how to check out values and actual selling prices of some of our collectibles on e-bay. CELEBRATING OUR 50TH ANNIVERSARY

This is the fourth in a series of our articles highlighting events during the 50-year history of St. Andrew By-The-Sea United Methodist Church. This article was originally written for our 40th anniversary by Eva Norton-Prude, our Church Historian at that time.

St Andrew's members ended the decade of the nineties just as they had begun – by doing God's business. In 1999, in conjunction with the S. C. Annual Conference, land was purchased in Okatie to build a church for the Church Of The Palms. A parish nurse was added to our staff. St. Andrew sponsored the first Community Thanksgiving Dinner at Hudson's Restaurant. Through the year, four different congregations used our building for services.

In 2000, Dr. E. David DuBois was named Associate Pastor, and a Children's Ministry Coordinator was added to the staff. At the S.C. Annual Conference in May, St. Andrew received the Bishop's 5-Star Award for Excellence in evangelistic ministry. This award recognizes growing churches with outstanding youth and outreach ministries, and churches that pay 100% of apportionments. Our UMYF won a 1st place award at Youth Annual Conference (YAC) for its innovative money-making "Flamingo Infestation Insurance." Before the year's end, a building committee was appointed to act on recommendations of the long range planning committee to expand our educational, administrative, and fellowship facilities. At Christmas, the sanctuary was made lovely by a large "Chrismon Tree," its lacy ornaments created by one of our church women.

In April 2001, 15 of our youth and five adults sailed a 66-foot working sailboat from Miami to Andros Island in the Bahamas where they spent a week repairing a church and holding worship services. This was St. Andrew's first venture in international mission trips! In June, the Rev. Doug Bowling was transferred to Greenville, and the Rev. Willie S. Teague was appointed our sixth minister. He and Marcella moved into the newly-decorated parsonage. The UMW Players, a new addition to the church's drama department, performed at the annual Christmas dinner of the Walterboro District ministers.. Before the year's end, the congregation approved construction of a multi-purpose building – it would become our Celebration Center. A groundbreaking ceremony for this 2.4 million dollar facility was held in February 2002, and it was consecrated in March 2003, with a festive service and luncheon attended by over 500 members.

The Teagues spent six weeks during the summer of 2002 in England, as part of a pastor exchange program. We hosted The Rev. Steve Mann, and his wife and son. Also in 2002, the Prayer Quilt Ministry was introduced, continuing to provide the gift of a quilt and a prayer to someone in need. A Director of Youth and Leisure Ministries was added to the staff, and also a full time Director of Music and Worship Arts/Organist. The church began Upward sports programs for our children and many others on the Island.

Stained glass windows were installed in the newly appointed Christ Chapel near the sanctuary, and weekly Healing and Wholeness services continue to be held there.

The church continued to grow in membership and program. The youth and adults spent a part of their summers doing repairs and ministry through the UMC's Salkehatchie Summer Service. Many members participated in building homes for Habitat For Humanity, and completed one home on our own.

In June, 2004, Willie was appointed to an Annual Conference position, and The. Rev. A. Clark Jenkins became our seventh minister. He and Carolyn became the new occupants of the parsonage.

In spring, 2005, our church enacted a lease of the Youth Center with "The Sandbox: An Interactive Children's Museum." Other highlights of the year included new stained glass windows installed in the library; an adult mission team went to Belize to work in a remote village; and our church became involved in disaster relief along the Gulf Coast, beginning a series of mission team trips there.

In late 2005, Jim Morrison became Associate Pastor when David DuBois moved to New York.

In March, 2006, a church woman was selected to participate in a pilot program of Women's Division and Volunteers in Missions, sending 12 women from across America on a women-to-women mission trip to Zimbabwe, Africa. Efforts were begun to outfit a trailer to be used following a disaster. A Relational Ministries team was organized to serve as lay visitors.

St. Andrew adopted Estill Middle School in early 2007, opening a new ministry of service by providing equipment and regular mentoring. Clark transferred to Kingsport, TN, in June, and the Rev. Neil M. Yongue became our eighth pastor. He and Imogene continue their service here.




Vacation Bible School
