

### **Trustee Tidbits**

#### December updates on current projects

• Positive activity is continuing on the sale of the Buckwalter property. Bluffton and Beaufort County are working together to finish the zoning changes needed for the

sale to proceed. The first quarter of 2024 continues to be the target to finalize the sale.

- The new A/C unit for the left side of the sanctuary has been installed and is working well.
- Tony Sotelo, our handyman, disassembled and removed the four obsolete A/C units on the admin building. At the same time, he has been working on repairing roof leaks in these areas. The long-term solution is having a synthetic membrane applied to the roof. Tony obtained a quote from a roofing company for \$36,000. We need to repair the current leaks but also investigate this long-term solution as funds are available.
- One of the new A/C units on the roof has been leaking due to a drain being clogged with leaves. Howell Chase has been contacted to come out and repair.
- Howell Chase installed a new drain pan to replace the cracked drain pan on the A/C unit in the Celebration Center
- Howell Chase installed 3 remote sensors in the Celebration Center. There are two more required including new thermostats. The ones that have been installed are functioning well. The remaining work will be completed when funds are available.
- Michael Tucker is working hard on implementing the Safety and Security Team. A consultant has been hired and will be on site in January to conduct training sessions for the team. If you are interested, please contact Michael.
- Bob Gentzler is finalizing the Trustee Long-range Financial Spreadsheet for 2024 and should be published within the next week.



Discouragement, depression fear can come many reasons losing someone to death, facing a




